PASTORAL LETTER

Please read this pastoral letter in all the churches on 9th August 2009, in connection with Prison Ministry Sunday.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ Jesus,

On this Prison Ministry Sunday, the church once again encourages the believers in Christ to live the words of Jesus, "When I was in prison you came to visit me". There are more than 3, 60,000 Prisoners in our country, languishing in 1397 prisons. The church tries to proclaim through the prison Ministry, the profound dignity of every human person despite of their cruelties, human dignity comes from God our creator, whose image we are all made. Despite their criminal behavior they are longing for love and affection. The thick wall of prison divides the world 'outside' and the world 'inside'. Those outside, they can go out where they want, when they want, meet with friends and relatives, but it is not so inside prison. The prisoners suffer from utter loneliness and helplessness. Love seems far away from their life. It is to such persons Prison Ministry India is reaching out.

When the adulterous woman was brought to Jesus for storming her to death, Jesus not, only challenges people who condemned her, He himself refused to condemn her and said to the woman. "Neither do I condemn you, go and do not sin again" (Jn 8, 9). Today the church invites us to do the same. The volunteers of PMI go regularly to the prisons and teach inmates about the unconditional love and forgiveness of Jesus. PMI recognized by the CBCI, also help the children of prisoners for their education. There are about 28 rehabilitation centers all over the country, and released prisoners are given a chance to renew their life at such centers, where they are formed mentally, spiritually and psychologically. This helps them to come back to the main stream of life. The inmates of rehabilitation centers are settled in marriage. Even a simple help or gesture can even those condemned to death. Our make a great difference in the life of prisoners. The PMI volunteers rekindle the spiritual flame in prisoners, lift them to high moral standards and renew their lives through counselling, cultural program, visiting the families, retreat, prayer, training in skills, free legal aid and the like.

Jesus said, "Whatever you do to the least of my brethren, you do it to me". With this attitude we go to the prisons and render possible services seeing the image of Christ in each person. Prison Ministry does not entertain any projects or foreign funds. Begging is our style, God's providence our bank account. There are about 6000 volunteers all over the country working for the welfare of prisoners, their children. We invite you my dear brothers and sisters to join with the prison ministry in creating a new society, by being a volunteer of prison ministry, sponsoring a prisoner for

his/her resettlement, education of the children, render financial help for the marriage of the children etc.,

PMI Sunday is celebrated in connection with the feast of St Maximilian Kolbe. He was imprisoned in the Concentration Camp during the IInd world war. He sacrificed his life for another. Jesus said "there is no greater love than that he lays down his life for others". We will surely be rewarded for the beautiful service we render to our brethren behind the bars.

"When I was in Prison You came to see me... now you enter the kingdom prepared for you".

PRISON MINISTRY: A CALL TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE

"Speak to God about prisoners before you speak about God to prisoners"

Prison Ministry India is a national voluntary organization working for the release, renewal and rehabilitation of prisoners as well as women in distress. Jesus said, I was in prison and you visited me. Though this was the ministry of Jesus from the

beginning of the church it was not given much importance in our church. Jesus was for the sinners and for the downtrodden, but in our ministries, we still forget to take care of the strayed ones and keep them away from our society. It was true that some voluntary groups and individuals were interested in visiting prisons and doing some kind of service to the prisoners in certain extend. But it got a new phase when some seminarians took initiative to take challenges to bring changes in the life of the prisoners. It was really a divine inspiration that prompted Bro Varghese Karipery and Bro Francis Kodiyan MCBS to take leadership in forming a group specially dedicated for the service of prisoners. It was truly divine, that is why it could grow so fast and become a national organization having thousands of volunteers rendering their selfless service in bringing up the lost brethren of our society.

We have always experienced God's special intervention in this ministry. The initiatives of the seminarians were very much appreciated and KCBC recognized it as church's ministry very soon. We got the recognition from CBCI in the year 2000. Now it has become a national organization having around 850 units and more than 6000 volunteers. In the year 2002 we could achieve a great honor by receiving the Spirit of Assisi National award for its humanitarian and spiritual service for the betterment of our suffering brethren. Number of priests, nuns, seminarians, laymen and women are engaged in this ministry. We have established 28 rehabilitation centers for the welfare of the released prisoners and the children of prisoners. The national office is at Bangalore and we have four regional offices in different parts of our country. All our activities are done with the help of our well-wishers and benefactors. Prison Ministry India does not have any foreign fund or projects.

It was again the divine intervention that in 2004 the Prison Ministry India got the permission from CBCI to celebrate the Sunday before August 15 as Prison Ministry Sunday. The theme of this year's Prison Ministry Sunday is "Let us come together to make a difference". This is a day set apart to pray for our suffering brethren behind the bars. People are still keeping these unfortunate ones away from the society. We even consider them as animals or good for nothing. But many of them are waiting for a chance to bring changes in their life. The life in the prison has melted the hard heart of many. But if we don't give them a chance in the proper time they may again fall into the same fate and lose their whole life.

Yes, Prison ministry Sunday is also an occasion to give awareness to the public about this particular ministry, our responsibility to give them a chance. Because we are specially loved by God and we are saved by the precious blood of Jesus. Though we have gone wrong and done mistakes, Jesus has always forgiven us and given chances for us to live again. Same Jesus have commanded us "Forgive others as I have forgiven you". There is a great blessing in loving these unwanted ones because Jesus

says, "If you love only those who love you what greatness do you have? Again, he says, if you greet only those who greet you what greatness do you have? Instead, you love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you". Yes, we are called to make a difference, difference in the life of an unwanted one.

Prisoners are not our enemies. Very often many of them are victims of situations. The only difference is that "they are inside and we are outside". It is God's providence for us that we are safe. Because, he loves and forgives us unconditionally. We need to show this love and forgiveness to those people who are suffering in the society. By doing this service to the suffering human beings, we are fulfilling the command of Jesus as well as getting the reward from the good Lord. Because Jesus says, "whenever you did it to the least of my brethren, you did it for me".

Yes, we are in need of your help to help the least brethren of our society. The national co-ordination work, functioning of the regional offices, legal help and release of the prisoners, maintenances in the rehabilitation centers education of the children of prisoners, marriage of women inmates, and various training programs all depend on your generous contributions. Once a beggar putting a small coin in our collection box for prisoners said, "thank God, I am a beggar, but not in the prison". Life in the prison is pathetic and unimaginable. Let us come together to make a difference to bring them back to the main stream of the society by extending our helping hands towards them. "Your mite is our might, come forward, may your small contribution make a difference in the life of one of these least brethren". God bless you all.

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
